About the Course:

India's foreign policy, since its independence, has focused on idealistic principles such as peaceful coexistence, independence of decision-making, promoting world order based on equality, rendering support to the UN, advocating the peaceful settlement of disputes, and extending bilateral and multilateral cooperation at regional and global levels. India aims to promote and protect its national interest, maintain sovereignty, protect its diaspora, promote international peace and arms reduction, achieve economic and national development, and oppose discrimination and colonialism.

The Cold War politics influenced India's foreign policy choices and defined its political, economic, and security relations with other states. However, India's nuclear tests in 1998 and its steady economic performance have changed not only its perception of itself but the world's perception of India. On the one hand, India is reorienting its policy towards its neighbours, and on the other hand, it is transcending its role/presence from its region to the rest of the world. The world recognises India as one of the rising powers. India is seen as not only a rule-taker but also a rule-maker and a rule-shaper. India is seen as a responsible country and reliable partner.

Course Objectives:

The course provides an outline of India's foreign policy. The objective of the course is to understand the basic ideas, principles, goals, internal and external factors, challenges, and opportunities that determine India's foreign policy. This course explains how India's foreign policy plays a significant role in the globalized world. In the course, we discuss how the Cold War politics influenced India's foreign policy choices, which defined its political, economic, and security relations with other states. We examine India's challenges and opportunities while pursuing its relations with major powers such as the US, Russia, and China in the post-Cold War period. Further, the course focuses on India's bilateral relations with neighbouring countries and its role in SAARC and inter-regional groupings such as BBIN, BIMSTEC, and BCIM. The course also analyses India's regional and international roles in UN, NAM, ASEAN, IBSA, BRICS, SCO, IORA, Quad, and G 20. The Course also examines India's role in global issues such as the world trade regime, climate change, nuclear proliferation, terrorism, intellectual property rights, global governance, etc. It also analyses India's role at the international level.

Internship:

An internship is a professional learning experience that offers meaningful, practical work related to a student's field of study or career interest. An internship gives a student the opportunity for career exploration and development, and to learn new skills.

On the job training:

On the job training is a form of training provided at the workplace. During the training, employees are familiarized with the working environment they will become part of. Employees also get hands-on experience using machinery, equipment, tools, materials, etc.

Internship / OJT Mechanism:

- 1. Pre-Approval: Students should seek approval from the college before starting the Internship /OJT. This ensures that the Internship / OJT aligns with the curriculum and meets the necessary criteria.
- 2. Mentor and Supervisor: Each student should have an assigned mentor at the organization/industry where they are interning. Additionally, an Internship / OJT supervisor from the college will be appointed to guide and monitor the progress.
- 3. Regular Reporting: Students should maintain regular communication with their supervisor and mentor, providing progress reports and seeking feedback.
- 4. Professional Conduct: Students must adhere to professional conduct throughout the Internship /OJT, including punctuality, respect for colleagues, and adherence to the organization's/industry's policies and guidelines.
- 5. Student Diary: Students should maintain a diary to document their experiences, challenges faced, and lessons learned during the Internship / OJT.
- 6. Final Report: At the end of the Internship / OJT, students should submit a comprehensive final report, summarizing their accomplishments, contributions, and key takeaways.

7. Evaluation: The Internship / OJT is worth 4 credits (equivalent to 100 marks), and the evaluation will be divided into two categories: one by the mentor and the other by the Internship / OJT supervisor. The mentor's evaluation (internal examination) will carry 40 marks, and it will be based on the student's performance during the Internship / OJT. External examination will be conducted by mentor and supervisor which will be based on the student's diary, the final report prepared by the student, and their performance in the final viva voce, and will carry 60 marks. The total marks obtained by the students in both evaluations will be added together for the purpose of final evaluation. The evaluation of the students will be conducted by the mentor using the valuation sheet provided by the college.

Internal Evaluation Criteria for Students by the Mentor:

- 1. Quality of Work (10 marks): How well did the student perform their assigned tasks during the Internship / OJT? Evaluate the accuracy, thoroughness, and attention to detail in their work.
- 2. Initiative and Proactiveness (10 marks): Did the student show initiative in taking on additional responsibilities or tasks beyond their assigned role? Did they demonstrate a proactive attitude towards problem-solving?
- 3. Communication Skills (10 marks): Assess the student's ability to communicate effectively with colleagues, superiors, and clients (if applicable). Consider both written and verbal communication.
- 4. Problem-Solving Skills and Time Management (10 marks): Evaluate the student's ability to analyze problems, propose solutions, and implement effective strategies to overcome challenges. How well did the student manage their time during the Internship / OJT? Were they able to meet project deadlines and handle multiple tasks efficiently?

External Evaluation Criteria for Students by the Supervisor and Mentor:

- 1. Student Diary (15 marks): Review the student's diary to understand their reflections, insights gained, and self-assessment of their performance during the Internship / OJT.
- 2. Final Report (15 marks): Evaluate the quality and comprehensiveness of the student's final report, including the clarity of their achievements and contributions.
- 3. Presentation of Student in Viva Voce (30 marks): Evaluate the responses given by the student to the questions asked by the faculty in the Viva Voce.

The course has the following Objectives;

- 2. be able to analyse and relate the relationship between world history and international economics and the evolution of global governance;

- 4. be able to connect the theoretical explanations of foreign policy with its practice;

This course has been designed to take the participants on a journey of international relations through the corridors of world history.

The long history of international relations dates back to ancient times. Classical writings by Thucydides, Kautilya and Sun Tzu are still studied to understand diplomacy.

After the Treaty of Westphalia in 1648, Nation-States became single unit actor of international relations. In the Post Westphalian arrangement the States got caught in paradoxical situation of balancing independence with inter-dependence. This complex nature of Inter-State behaviour called for new theories to explain it, for example, Idealism, Realism, Liberalism, Marxism etc. While these theories were still at work, the two world wars shook the world only to change it immensely. The devastation of the World Wars directly affected people, thus, involved individuals in the international affairs and paved the way for international organisations as actors of international Relations as an academic discipline. After decolonization and end of Cold War, the world order was no more about two super powers only, instead that was replaced with new centers of powers at regional as well as State levels and the third world has risen. This marked yet another dynamic of the inter-State relations and added to the subject matter of International Relations.

This course is planned to study the subject of International Relations keeping a focus on how it developed and shaped itself over the different periods of history. It would be interesting to note that the lessons from history have a reflection on the inter-State behaviours today. The Course involves renowned faculty from JNU, IIM, National Law University, Fmr. Ambassadors etc.
