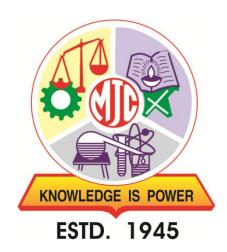

Credit distribution structure for four years /one-year UG BAprogramme Academic Year 2024-25




